(1) Take the March Reading Challenge -- For March our library's round table of suggested reading based on a monthly theme is going BOTH in-person and virtual. This month's theme is "Music to My Ears"

On **Wednesday**, **March 9**, **2021** at **6:30** p.m. **OR Wednesday**, **March 10**, **2021** at **10:30** a.m. this virtual book club will discuss "**Homegoing**" by **Yaa Gyasi**. This book takes you on a journey from Ghana's Gold Coast to the plantations of Mississippi to present day. Spanning eight generations "Homegoing" begins in the 18th century with the story of Effia who marries a British slave trader, and Esi who is sold into slavery. Follow their story and their descendants as they live through the legacy of slavery. This discussion will be moderated by Rebecca Gokberk.

On **Wednesday**, **March 24**, **2021 at 10:30 a.m.** this virtual book club will discuss **"All This Could Be Yours" by Jami Attenberg**. In this book the author explores the impact of being caught in the web of a toxic man whose actions affect a family for generations. The discussion will be moderated by Katie Kenny.

Tuesday, March 9, 2021 at 10:30 a.m. -- "Women Lighthouse Keepers" Lighthouse Keeper was one of the first government career fields opened to women. **Mary Rasa**, a historian who worked as a museum curator and park ranger for the National Park Service for 16 years, will explore the U.S. Lighthouse Service, and look at five remarkable women lighthouse keepers, including one Monmouth County resident.

Thursday, March 18, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. -- Bernadette Rogoff will present "We Are Present and Future Women -- Freehold Young Ladies' Seminary, 1845-1898. Ms. Rogoff, author and Director of Collections at the Monmouth County Historical Association, will spotlight the Freehold Young Ladies' Seminary, one of the most prestigious female educational institutions on the eastern seaboard, as well as give a glimpse into the lives of the some of the impressive women who attended.

Thursday, March 30, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. -- "A Life of My Own: Meeting Eleanor Roosevelt This virtual one woman play, by author Stephen LaRocque, stars television, stage and film actress Linda Kenyon. In period costume, Ms. Kenyon illuminates Mrs. Roosevelt's life and work which made her an inspiration to people all around the world.

Wednesday, March 31, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. -- "The Skirt and Stocking Clad Soldier" Mary Rasa, a historian who worked as a museum curator and park ranger for the National Park Service for 16 years, will discuss the first women to join the military during World War II, their civilian defense worker counterparts, as well as the Women's Army Corps members from Fort Hancock and Monmouth County. Interested in learning more about what documents are housed in the archives? The archives website, MonmouthCountyClerk.com/Archives, is the gateway to knowledge about records in the Archives. Interested in visiting the Monmouth County Archives? The archives are located on the lower level of the Monmouth County Library headquarters in Manalapan and is currently open to the public by appointment only. <u>Help Our Community</u> -- Want to do your part to help our community and our state during these difficult times? Here are simple ways you can make a difference.

(1) You Know Everyone Is Being Encouraged to Get the COVID 19 Vaccine, But Do You Still Have Questions? -- Well thanks to the Monmouth County Library answers are available. To learn more about the COVID 19 vaccines join Dr. Jay Kostman, Director of the John Bell Health Center on Wednesday, March 24, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. for a virtual program offering information on the vaccines for COVID -19 including how they were developed, how they are being used, their effectiveness and how they are tolerated.

This session will be conducted on Zoom and is free of charge. **Registration and internet access is required.** To register go to the Monmouth County Library EventKeeper site by clicking here Select "Timely Topics" from the drop-down box. - (2) Tighten Up and Double Up -- We all know that the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines encourage everyone to mask up. But, with new COVID mutations spreading, the CDC also is now strongly encouraging everyone to ensure that the mask they wear fits tightly against the face. If you don't have a N95 or KN95 mask, the CDC recommends that you wear TWO masks (a disposable mask with a cloth mask over it) to ensure a tight fit to help protect yourself and those around you.
- (3) Roll Up Your Sleeve -- As the country continues to face the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, good news is on the horizon as vaccines against the virus are gradually becoming available to residents of our state. If you haven't already done so, go to https://covidvaccine.nj.gov/ to preregister to get the vaccine. Registration takes just a few minutes (be sure to have your insurance card handy). Once registered, you will receive an email notifying you when you are eligible to make an appointment to be vaccinated.

(4) Add Your Phone to the Fight Against COVID-19 -- COVID Alert is New Jersey's free and secure mobile app that anonymously alerts users if they have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. The app also provides users with up-to-date information on New Jersey reopening news, key COVID-19 metrics, and offers a user-friendly symptom tracking tool. The app will never record any identifying data. All users will remain anonymous. To download the app go to: https://covid19.nj.gov/pages/app
