Updates from the Township of Ocean Library

- (1) Book Club -- The Ocean Township Library Book Club will meet on November 6, 2025 at 10:30 a.m. to discuss "Never Let Me Go" by Kazuo Ishiguro. This book tells the story of three children Kathy, Ruth, and Tommy -- all students at Hailsham, an exclusive English boarding school. It is a place of cliques and mysterious rules where teachers constantly remind their charges of how special they are. Now years later, Tommy and Ruth reenter Kathy's life. And for the first time she is beginning to look back at the past and understand just what it is that makes them special and how that gift will shape the rest of their time together. The discussion will be moderated by librarian Adam Rule. Copies of the book are available for pick up at our library's circulation desk. Please note: No registration is required to participate.
- (2) In-person Short Story Discussion -- A short story discussion, moderated by Branch Manager Mary Patterson, will be held on November 13, 2025 at 10:30 a.m. The story is "Neighbors" by Raymond Carver. General Eisenhower, assisted by the British, an Angelo-American force landed in French Morocco and Algeria with the aim to gain complete control of North Africa and defeat General Rommel's German-Italian army. This informative lecture will shed light on Operation Torch, the first successful Allied combined operation, including how and why it did succeed. Don't miss this opportunity to gain firsthand insights from a distinguished historian and U.S. Army veteran. No registration is required.

- (7) Watch Alert -- New Jersey has experienced below-average precipitation during 10 of the last 12 months --with rainfall one to six inches below normal over the past 90 days

alone. As a result, our state has announced that we are now under a Drought Watch. Residents of the state, including those in Ocean Township, are urged to take voluntary water conservation measures -- including reducing indoor water use, fixing leaks around your home, delaying lawn reseeding until conditions improve, running your washing machine and dishwasher only when full, and adjusting automatic sprinkler systems. With just a little effort each of us can do our part to help.

- (8) Fire Safety -- Daylight Savings Time ends on November 2, 2025. Fire Departments across our state are reminding everyone that this is the perfect time to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Grab a Book and Sit Awhile

Looking for a good book to read this month? No problem! This month we once again are spotlighting several different ways you can locate recommended books in just about every genre.

(1) A Friend's Pick -- As you know, we occasionally feature books recommended by one or more of our members. This month, one of our members, Carol Wasserman, is recommending the book "Cloud Cuckoo Land" by Anthony Doerr, the Pulitzer Prize-winning author of "All the Light We Cannot See".

The novel, which was on the *New York Times* bestseller list for over 20 weeks, is set in the 15th century, in present day, and in a not-so-distant future. It is a soaring story about children on the cusp of adulthood in worlds in peril, who find resilience, hope, and a book - the story of Aethon who longs to be turned into a bird so he can fly to a utopian paradise in the sky.

Carol says... "This book took a little longer than normal to really grab me, but when it did I couldn't put it down. What began as several somewhat disjointed stories suddenly fell together with an 'AHA' like I've never experienced in another book. It is one that I plan to read again after learning how the separate stories fit together."

This book is a National Book Award Finalist and was named Best Book of the Year by the Associated Press, *Time* magazine, *Entertainment Weekly*, and more. *The Washington Post* says "If you're looking for a superb novel, look no further." and *The New York Times* Book Review says that it is "wildly inventive, a humane and uplifting book for adults that's infused with the magic of childhood reading experiences".

(2) Our Collective History -- If you enjoy books about American history then be sure to check out our newsletter's latest feature. This month we'll once again explore our country's collective history by recommending a topic or individual worth investigating through books.

For this month's topic, we suggest exploring the life and legacy of American aviation pioneer Amelia Earhart. Earhart, born and raised in Kansas, developed a passion for flying at a very young age. In 1932 she became the first woman to fly a solo nonstop transatlantic flight and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for her achievement. An early supporter of the Equal Rights Amendment, Earhart was one of the first aviators to promote commercial air travel and she wrote several best-selling books about her flying experiences. Earhart also was instrumental in the formation of the Ninety-Nines, an organization of female pilots.

In 1937, during an attempt to become the first female pilot to circumnavigate the world, Earhart and her navigator, Fred Noonan, disappeared. It is generally believed that the plane she was flying, a Lockheed Model 10-E Electra, crashed into the ocean near Howland Island (a relatively tiny speck of coral in the Pacific Ocean) after running out of fuel. A contributing factor likely may have been the fact that her husband had prodded her to remove important navigation, communication and safety equipment to lighten her fuel-laden plane. She was officially declared dead, at the age of 41, nearly 1 1/2 years after the crash.

Earhart was posthumously inducted into the National Aviation Hall of Fame and the National Women's Hall of Fame. While many have sought to locate her plane's wreckage, to date no definitive findings have been made.

There are several excellent books available to learn more about Amelia Earhart - including this year's release "The Aviator and the Showman: Amelia Earhart, George
Putnam and the Marriage that Made An America Icon" by Laurie Gwen Shapiro. In the book
Shapiro explores Earhart's drive and the ways her husband George Putnam put her at risk. Other
books about this female aviator include: "20 Hours. 40 Minutes: Our Flight in the
Friendship" by Amelia Earhart, "Amelia, My Courageous Sister: Biography of Amelia Earhart:
True Facts About Her Disappearance" by Muriel Earhart Morrissey, "Amelia Earhart: The

Sound of Wings" by Mary S. Lovell, and "Amelia Earhart: A Life from Beginning to End" by Hourly History.

If you are interested in making your exploration of Amelia Earhart's life a family affair, there also are many well-written children's books about her -- "The Girl Who Reached for the Sky" by Sarah Michaels (geared for ages 7 - 12), "Amelia Earhart: A Kids Book About Flying Against All Odds" by Mary Nhin (geared for ages Baby - 12), "Who Was Amelia Earhart" by Kate Boehm Jerome (geared for ages 7 - 12), and "I Am Amelia Earhart" by Brad Meltzer (geared for ages 3 - 6).

We hope you'll enjoy learning more about this remarkable American pioneer.

- (3) Are You a True Crime and Supernatural Forces Aficionado? -- then you may want to check out a new book by Robert Hilland and John Edwards. The book, "Chasing Evil: Shocking Crimes, Supernatural Forces and an FBI Agent's Search for Hope and Justice", tells how a skeptical FBI agent reached out to a world-famous psychic for help solving a baffling murder case -- leading to a twenty-five year partnership and crime-solving journey. The book is a heart-stopping story of murder, investigation, justice, and finding help in unexpected places. Library Journal's review of the book stated "This riveting true crime book is a thriller, a memoir, and a meditation on the unknown, with all the intensity of a big-screen drama and the soul of deeply personal reckonings...The tension is relentless, the writing cinematic and the tone urgent". This book has a 4.8 (out of 5.0) rating on Amazon and a 4.6 (out of 5.0) rating on Goodreads.
- (4) Books Galore -- If you enjoy losing yourself in a fiction or non-fiction book, this year has provided you with a bumper crop of great books to enjoy. And, New Yorker magazine wants to make sure you don't miss even one of these page-turners, so it has created a list of "The Best Books of the Year So Far". The list includes such great reads as "The Gods of New York" by Jonathan Mabler, "The Gossip Columnist's Daughter" by Peter Orner, "Will There Ever Be Another You" by Patricia Lockwood, "This Kind of Trouble" by Tochi Eze, "Heart the Lover" by Lily King, and many more. But, never fear...help is at hand thanks to a new book by Emmy-winning comedy writers Carol Leifer and Rick Mitchell entitled "How to Write a Funny Speech...for a Wedding, Bar Mitzvah, Graduation & Every Other Event You Didn't Want to Go to in the First Place". Quick and easy to use, this book will help you write the perfect speech so you can (as the authors say) "look awesome, make some people laugh, and get it over with". The book is broken into short chapters full of tips and advice. You'll learn how to properly write and deliver your speech so you'll flatter your subject but, also keep the audience interested. And, you'll even

get help figuring out how to deliver comedic lines successfully to make your speech a success. With a foreword by the queen of comedy, Carol Burnett, this book has a 4.4 (out of 5.0) rating on Amazon.

(6) Short Stories—If our library branch's monthly short story discussion has you interested in exploring more short stories, then good news...Goodreads is coming to the rescue to help you get started. That's because Goodreads has compiled a list of the "96 Great Short Story Collections from the Past Three Years". The list includes collections such as "You Like It Darker" by Stephen King, "Good and Evil and Other Stories" by Samanta Schweblin, "The Faraway World" by Patricia Engel, "Tailored Realities" by Brandon Sanderson, "The Disappeared" by Andrew Porter, and many more.
